## On building solidarity

The Trump administration's freeze on foreign aid assistance has had "catastrophic results," for LGBTQ+ groups around the world, **David Mixner Fellow Edric Huang** reports from the 10th ILGA Asia conference in Singapore, the largest gathering of LGBTQ+ activists on the continent. Activist groups had relied on USAID, he writes, as societal stigma and discriminatory laws discouraged local donors.

### **Greenland chairs Arctic Council**

At a precarious moment for the Arctic Council, which is facing existential threats from both Russia and the United States, Greenland takes the helm for the first time, **Peter Bird Martin Fellow Brett Simpson** reports. She asks whether the council's first-ever Indigenous chair will effect change in the current climate.

### On thinning ice

As the long Arctic winter abated at Brett's base in Tromsø, Norway, it remained a force to be reckoned with. "Ice is the protagonist," she writes. "And like any good character, she's dynamic and evolving."



### Rifles, skis and snow tanks

On the day several NATO countries held military exercises in Finland last February, temperatures should have been far below freezing. But with the sun splitting through forest trees, Brett writes, it was clear that climate change will provide a mounting challenge in addition to the threat from Russia.

### High latitudes, high tensions

Arctic Frontiers, an annual international conference held in Tromsø in January, felt palpably political this year, Brett reports. She was also a panelist at the event. Three years after Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the post-Cold War era of polar peace may be coming to an end.

He says Portugal faces a critical shortage of medical professionals that has been decades in the making.

# In Portugal, promoting safety at the party

Rowland visits a Lisbon non-profit that provides an essential safety service for recreational drugs users, outside the reach of state health organizations. The group tests batches of drugs and sends warnings about dangerous levels of contaminants through social media and chat groups.



# MAGA 2.0 upends international narcotic drug policy

Rowland traveled to Vienna in March for the 68th Commission on Narcotic Drugs. Traditionally guided by the US agenda, discussions ended in disarray this year when the Trump administration announced its plan to stop cooperation, he writes, opening a path for others to assert autonomy and global leadership.




